### Newcomers Join Melodrama Cast

Peggy Sheldon, who moved to Northfield with her husband about a year ago, is playing Paige Turner (one of the villain's love-interests). Dan and Rhoda Van Tassel, who moved to Northfield from

San Diego this summer, will be our Hero and Heroine.

All three of these people had previous connections to Northfield, which partly explains their decisions to move here. Dan was a St. Olaf college student when he met Rhoda, who had grown up in Dundas, at a 4<sup>th</sup> of July celebration in Dundas. After marrying, they were both graduate students at the University of Iowa, and then both pursued careers in college teaching, while also raising two children. They have held positions at several colleges across the country, including Muskingum College in Ohio, Concordia College-Moorehead, MN, and Chapman

College in California. Rhoda says they have "come back home for the final chapter." Rhoda has pursued acting in community theater, taking many roles in dramas and comedies. Her favorite role was Lady Macbeth ("It doesn't get much better than that"). Dan also acted in some community theater productions, and the two of them played opposite each other in Love Letters. - Mike's Story

A moderate current flowed in from the deep water ahead to the 70-foot bottom where I swam. The currents felt stronger and I was feeling older. Kicking hard into the current and toward the edge, I was aware of my labored breathing: inhaling produced a mechanical sucking sound from the respirator; exhaling, a release of bubbles floated toward the surface.

I located a dead though stout piece of coral and hooked on with a seven-foot nylon line and let the current swing me around and up until I floated like a kite in the current and faced directly over the edge. At that moment it was effortless, and enjoyable. Behind lay coral and sea life, their colors muted in the depths to green and blue, but I was there for the

show ahead: a sea turtle in a graceful pirouette; a thousand schooling fish – more probably, several thousand – and constantly on patrol, the Grey Reef and White Tip sharks.

From behind, a Spotted Eagle Ray swam up alongside of me and stopped, her wings gently undulated to anchor her in place at my side. I could have touched her, but I didn't. To this day, I wonder what she was thinking. Together, we gently floated left and then right in synchronous rhythm with the current and looked out onto a living Eden in the warm, turquoise sea.

#### **MEDICARE** PART D

#### IT'S MEDICARE AS **USUAL**

If you are 65 and have Medicare, you can ignore all of the media messages about the Affordable Care Act. They are not for you. However, October 15-December 7 is still the time for you to review your current Part D Prescription Drug Plan and your Medicare supplemental insurance.

You can check out your options on www.medicare. gov or fill out the information form enclosed in this newsletter and drop it off at the Senior Center Reception Desk. A Medicare counselor will call you after October 15 and either make an appointment with you or let you know that the Medicare web site does not suggest more affordable options. If you

choose to switch either Part D Plans or Medicare supplement plans, the Medicare counselor can assist you.

When you fill out the information form, be sure to list the full name of all prescription drugs, the dosage you take, and how often you take it. Do not include overthe-counter medications. All of your information will be confidential.

#### **Advancement Committee**

Duane Everson reported. Annual fund donations total \$36,625 from 305 donors, including 26 sustaining donors. The goal is \$70,000. Evaluation of Vintage Band Festival: the event was sold out, but the Center lost money. The committee is discussing whether to have one big yearly event whose focus is substantial fundraising.

#### **Executive Committee**

Gerry Gengenbach reported.
