
Memory Café Starts April 20, 1:30 pm

Currently she is working with the Northfield Act on Alzheimer's group, is a board member for the Minnesota Gerontology Society, and for many years was the Activity Director for the long term care unit at Northfield Hospital.







The Civil War Fife and Drum Saturday, April 9, 7 PM

Spectators are welcome to watch the action!


Radio Dramedy -April 30, 7 pm and May 1, 2 pm

The Seven Gates of Happiness Deb Seitz in China Written by Steven James Beto

Three of the youngest children jumped on the bed in Deb's apartment, their fingertips and laughter leaping toward the ceiling, while the four oldest-Ian, Sophie, Laura (their chosen Western names), and Phong Le-sat at the dining room table looking at Phong Le's birthday cake. Candles were not allowed in the living quarters in Mong Kok, a suburb of Hong Kong, to prevent fires that would quickly spread throughout one of the densest populations on earth. "On weekends, I often took kids home," said Deb. The children, the sons and daughters of Vietnamese boat people, fled from North or South Vietnam fearing for their lives, and for the hopes of opportunity and survival.

Phong Le's family escaped Vietnam in a small boat and desperately tried to sail over heavy seas to the Philippines where the camps were run by Americans and known to be safer. "No one wanted to end up in China out of fear that they would not be classified as refugees, but illegal immigrants, and at best, sent back to Vietnam," Deb added. Phong Le's boat, however, was caught in a great storm. In danger of capsizing, they were forced to land in Hong Kong.

After graduating from Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota, in 1984 Deb became employed by the American Lutheran Church Office, and through their missionary department, Deb accepted a 3 year assignment to New Horizons School in Kowloon, Hong Kong. The ALC provided a small stipend and an apartment just a few short, but crowded miles from the camp.

On Sunday afternoons, Deb and the children walked back to the camp passed a solid line of buildings with no green spaces. All of the buildings shared a common wall, one after another. If everyone came out of the buildings at the same time, there would be no room for them in the streets. "We traditionally stopped at a McDonalds, where I had the children order in English." Every opportunity was used to teach, and for the children to learn English.

The Kai Tak Refugee Camp had been a Royal Air Force Base. Tall, chain-link fences topped with barbed wire surrounded a building complex of tin shacks. Two gates served as entry for an enclosed area of several square blocks. A dilapidated bus painted in psychedelic colors served as the pre-school. Deb taught English, social studies, science, math-anything that could be used as a means to teach English—in the only concrete building located

just on the other side of the fence. Sikhs wearing turbans stood as guards at every gate. If they had weapons, they were not readily visible. The Kai Tak refugees came and went as they pleased; many adults had jobs in factories where they could earn small amounts of money to meet their basic needs.

Deb and the children entered the encampment onto a large dirt field used as a playground. The kids burst through the gate and ran toward their living quarters where their parents waited in one of hundreds of corrugated tin, multi-family huts. Inside the living quarters, chain link fences separated the tightly spaced sleeping areas looking like small cages. Cooking spaces were provided outside the huts to prevent fire. One day, smoke began to pour out of Phong Le's hut; the children ran screaming out onto the playground area; the mothers ran for the hose. The cracking flames and black smoke consumed all of their belongings before the firemen from town could arrive. Everyone had to start from nothing yet

again. Fortunately, no one was hurt.

It was far more dangerous at night. The guards left their posts at sundown and left the gates open for the returning factory workers. A criminal organization known as the Triads took advantage of the lack of security and sent representatives to the camp to recruit children for gangs or, sadly, prostitution. "I returned to the camp after dark one night. A group of kids surrounded me and stole my watch right off my wrist without me even knowing about it. I never felt unsafe. But that had been my favorite scuba diving watch!" You learn quickly.

In her second year, Deb painted the classroom door in bright, primary colors and called it, "The Magic English Door." Once the children passed through the magic door, everything was spoken in English. It didn't matter how long the learning took, Deb knew they would get there together. All of the furnishings, desks, blackboards, books, mimeograph machines, and maps, were donated by the Hong Kong International School and other similar institutions. "One year, my mother and sister came to visit and read to the children in class," said Deb.

Read-a-louds are essential in language learning, and these were not intellectually challenged kids. Many of them were multi-lingual already speaking fluent Vietnamese, French, Chinese, and would likely go on to add another European language depending on where they ended up. Being a refugee doesn't mean you're stupid.

A lot of Deb's pictures and memories are at airports sharing hugs and waving good-bye to the children. Ian went to Sacramento, California, and runs a successful landscaping business. Laura went to Sweden and became a fashion designer. Phong Le was sent to England and her family later joined her there. Sophie went on to Canada. When it came time for Deb to leave, she didn't want to go. "I tried to get a job with the International School, but they didn't have an opening." On the airplane trip to Japan, an old Chinese woman held her hand and helped Deb through her tears. "I called my mother when I arrived in Minneapolis and she told me that the International School contacted her saying that they have an opening for me. I just couldn't do it. I had suffered too many emotions on my trip back to

the States ever to want to do that again."

These were the times before Internet, and she agonized over the thought of never again having contact with the children. "I had given my home address to Phong Le, and we began a long correspondence," Deb added with a smile.

In the meantime, Deb married, had two children of her own, and adopted five more. Phong Le, it turned out, had kept a correspondence with Ian and they eventually married. Phong Le now holds dual citizenship with England and the United States. In 2006, Phong Le, Ian, and their 2 sons came to Faribault to visit Deb and meet her family. The Faribault Daily News paper made a wonderful fuss over it.

"I want to share with you a letter that I received from Sophie early on": Dear Miss Asp ("My maiden name."), One year, I go to the Canada. I go and mother very happy. I go and grandmother very happy. One day, I go to Amarica ("Her spelling."). You give me picture.

"I have been just sick over the letter for years because I could not respond," said Deb. The return address that Sophie provided: "Sophie in Canada." With the advent of social media perhaps one day, Deb will wake to find a friendship request on Facebook from her Sophie.
