WHAT'S IN A NAME?

What's in a name? Identity. Brand.

If you've been to the Northfield Senior Center lately, you'll know that the board and staff are looking at the question of changing the name of the organization. There is a jar in the lobby inviting you for suggestions of a new name for the Center going forward.

Thy change it? It describes what we are: a place (Center) in this town (Northfield) especially for older adults (Seniors). When the name was chosen about 40 years ago, many other Minnesota towns were developing similar places, just for older adults providing healthy meals and fun social activities. And like our organization, their names are all "(their city/town) Senior Center." In the 20th Century, "X Senior Center" accurately described what these places were.

In 2016, does Senior Center still describe this

organization well? "Beauty is in the eye of the beholder." People who participate here - who play ping pong, play cards, work out in the fitness room, join exercise classes, ride weekly with the Northfield Pedalers, attend stimulating lectures, walk slowly through the Art Gallery on their way to eat, perform in plays – those people know that this organization is still a great "place in Northfield especially for older adults." The problem comes in what this name communicates to those who have not yet come here. Membership is open to people who are 50 and older, but many in their 50's and 60's do not want to think of themselves as "senior." I have even met members who are in their 50's and say they love this place, but don't want to tell their friends that they work out at a "Senior" center.

The Rochester Senior Center has a new facility (they're finally catching up to us with a pool and fitness room), and they are using this opportunity to adopt a new name: "125 Live," using the new address as part of the new name. The danger in changing one's name is that people will be confused, not knowing who we are. Or some who have loved being a part of the Northfield Senior Center might feel alienated.

n egardless of whether The name is changed or stays the same, we have a marketing-identity issue. How do we let others know what this place is truly like? How do we convince others to come here...to join, to take one class, to attend a melodrama? I am reminded of the efforts Buick has taken in recent years to convince us that their cars are more up-to-date, or the tag line Pepsi adopted, "Pepsi – the next generation." Think about it, and if you have a good idea, please enter it into the jar near the coffee bar.



Senior Center adds Hearing Assist System

Lena: Ole, hold still. You've got something in your ear.
-- Let me see what it is! Oh my goodness -- it's a suppository'!!!

Ole: "OH NO -- Well, at least now I know where my hearing aid probably is!."

Hearing loss is one of the most common conditions affecting older adults. Approximately 17 percent, or 36 million, of American adults report some degree of hearing loss. There is a strong relationship between age and reported hearing loss: 18 percent of American adults 45-64 years old, 30 percent of adults 65-74 years old, and 47 percent of adults 75 years old, or older, have a hearing impairment. Men are more likely to experience hearing loss than women.

The Northfield Senior Center has recently installed the Williams Sound 457 Personal Listening System in Rooms 103-105. It is similar to systems in many churches. If you need assistance, someone will help you. When you come to an event look for the ticket table with the receivers and headphones. Pick one up, turn it on, put on the headphones and enjoy!

Currently we have 4 receivers. More can be added as

needed. You can bring your own earphone and plug it into the receiver. The system also works with the T Coil that is already in many hearing aids. You will need to pick up the Hearing Loop, put it around your neck, plug it into the receiver, and turn on the T Coil setting on your hearing aid.

More Bits and Pieces About the Beginnings of the Senior Center

Women rise again and again: Molly Woehrlin, Dorothy Headley, Mary Lou Street, Beverly Finholt, Elaine Thurston, and many, many others. A local Sociology professor said, "This town is full of intelligent, well-educated woman who are under employed." He added this was why things happened in Northfield. These women had time and paid attention to the realities around them. They used time to discuss these issues, and had the gumption to do something about them.

The idea that began in **1960**, let's bring Senior Citizens together in local churches for fellowship and for educational programs, grew like Topsy.

In 1968, Beverly Finholt chaired the United Way. When she learned there was \$2,000 surplus, rather than divide it into bits, the decision was made to use it for a special project. This project, a Community Center, handled volunteer training, the development of a volunteer program, and information and referrals. Molly Woehrlin, Mary Lou Street and Dorothy Headley led the project.

The former Parish House at Third and Union was rented from the First UCC Church for \$1.00 a year. Mary Wood was hired part time as volunteer coordinator for the new program which took over the second floor. Former bedrooms held the Clothes Closet and an office. When Clothes Closet donations poured in, volunteer drivers were called on to take the well sorted overflow to surrounding towns in need. In the meantime, other volunteer drivers took Meals on Wheels where needed.

A day care filled the first floor of the former Parish House. Dorothy Headley brought Head Start to Northfield and coordinated volunteer drivers to transport the kids.

Mary Lou Street began Project Friendship which was soon followed by the A Better Chance (ABC) Program that brought African American students from inner cities into Northfield and the Northfield High School. Male students lived in the big white house across the street from First UCC Church. Barbara and Dick Crouter were the first house advisors. Female students lived with families. Later, female students lived in the white house while the male students lived with families. Future house advisors include Holly and Mark

Fischer and Mr. & Mrs. Fred Tripp.

The **1973** questionnaire mentioned in last month's newsletter was designed by Professor William Cupp from the St. Olaf Sociology Department and sent out in the monthly utility bill. Responses showed Senior Citizens needed meals, transportation, and a place to get together. The grant funded through Southeastern Minnesota Area Agency on Aging allowed for transportation and the hiring of a part time Senior Services Coordinator - Elaine Thurston.

1976 A request was made to the City of Northfield for a permanent Senior Center!

In 1978, the place to get together and to dine once or twice a week was the fellowship hall in the First UCC Church. Volunteers from the Lions' Club picked up food for the meal from a local restaurant and delivered it. The United Way subsidized the cost of food.

1978 was a big year for good change. Church Women United and The Community Action Center went to the City Council and asked that the empty Alliance Church on the corner of 10th and Division be purchased. A bond issue for this to-becalled Community Services

Building passed. The city contracted with the CAC to manage the building and to provide programs for Senior Citizens. Northfield Senior Citizens, Inc. incorporates!

Two more events took place: the CAC received an Older Americans' Act grant to improve Senior Center space in the church, and SEMCAC contracted to provide Senior Dining.

The upstairs of the church held the Senior Center. The Food Shelf and the Clothes Closet shared the downstairs. People were in and out of this great place in numbers that could have used a revolving door.

By **1981,** a new coordinator for the Senior Center was hired by the CAC. Her name? Connie Weber.

So ends Chapter-the Second of the Northfield Senior Center.

Getting the Word(s) Out...

Too many people in North-field don't know where the Northfield Senior Center is located. Even fewer of them would be able to tell you what kinds of activities take place here – or in the rest of the Northfield Community Resource Center, where six other non-profits provide vital services to the city's residents, including the CAC's food shelf and Head Start.

That will change in August. The Northfield Senior Center Board of Directors has approved a sign holding back-to-back digital message boards to be installed along Jefferson Parkway in front of the Center. The sign is being funded in large part by a

generous donation from the daughters of Joan Bowman Ashmore, in honor of her 90th birthday. The sign is ordered and is being fabricated. When it is operational, it will deliver messages about the activities of NCRC partners to the occupants of the more than 7000 vehicles that pass daily on Jefferson Parkway.


The message boards, which will be 3'8" high and 8'1" wide and installed in a casing that is 8'4" wide and 8' high, will feature red lettering on a black background. Messages will change every three minutes at first (they are permitted by ordinance to change every minute) and will be displayed during the hours that parts of the complex are open for business, i.e., not usually before 6 a.m. or after 9 or 10 p.m.

The partners in the NCRC are working now on determining what those messages should be. They'll include everything from talking points (generic statements, organizational branding) to programming information (classes, deadlines, special events) and daily calendar items (Thursday's Table, Job Club, Sunshine Café, etc.). They will not include paid advertisements or announcements about off-premise entities other than the Popcorn Wagon, the Used a Bit Shop, and the Clothes Closet.

Look for announcements in August about when the new sign will be dedicated and begin informing Northfielders about the services provided by the Northfield Senior Center and its NCRC partners.
