

## You can Support Christmas Sharing

The Community Action Center Christmas Sharing program will provide over 800 children this year with toys home-made pajamas, books, mittens, gloves, hats and homemade quilts.

Each year, the Northfield Senior Center lobby Christmas tree starts as a "mitten tree". The tree is decorated with paper mittens. Written on the mittens is an age of a child that needs warm hats and mittens. Members support Christmas Sharing by taking a paper mitten from the tree and purchasing age appropriate mittens, hats, or gloves for the child. Warm mittens and gloves are emphasized. Homemade items are acceptable. You bring them to the Senior Center and we hang them on the tree. Items will be accepted until December 12.

Through the Community Action Center Christmas Sharing Program, there will be approximately 804 children from the Northfield School District served this season. This year Christmas Sharing will take place on December 13 and is held down the hall in Senior Center rooms 104-106 and 103-105. If you have not experienced Christmas Sharing, stop in a take a peek. The rooms are filled to the brim with toys, pajamas, quilts, etc. for families to choose from for their kids. ### PUBLIC INFORMATION: NORTHFIELD MUNICIPAL I.D.

Imagine not being able to fill your prescription for a muchneeded pain medication, or be able to buy over-the-counter flu medicine. Imagine not being able to cash a check at the bank, or get a refund on a pair of socks you bought at Target. These frustrating roadblocks are an everyday occurrence for residents of Northfield who don't have a photo I.D. card, because they don't drive or don't qualify for a state I.D. card.

The Northfield City Council will vote this December to create the Northfield Municipal I.D. program, an initiative that the Northfield Human Rights Commission has tagged as furthering equity and inclusiveness in our city.

What is the Northfield Municipal I.D.? An identification card issued by the City of Northfield that establishes residency and identity. At a minimum the I.D. displays the cardholder's photo, name, date of birth, signature, and dates of issuance and expiration. The card may also indicate of the cardholder is an organ donor, and provide medical and emergency contact information.


The I.D. does not confer legal status or driving and voting privileges.

Applicants will be screened carefully by the city, and charged a small fee for processing the card.

As well as practical uses, the card has personal value. The card says, "This is me. I live here." The cardholder will have a greater feel of belonging to the Northfield community, which a state I.D. cannot provide. Cardholders can face any situation with confidence, security and dignity.



#### 1. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Gordon Kelley at 3:01 p.m.

#### 2. REPORTS

#### <u>Review of Financial</u> <u>Reports</u>

Tom Brawley reviewed the September financial statements.

#### **Finance Committee**

Tom Brawley reported. October 19 meeting minutes were reviewed. Income is at 79.57% and expense is at 77.79% compared to projected 75%. Expenses reflect three payrolls, and unbudgeted expense for Branding. The committee approved the contract with CliftonLarsonAllen to complete the 2018 audit and 990 report.

#### <u>Advancement</u> <u>Committee</u>

Beth Endert reported. October 5 meeting minutes were reviewed. The Sock Hop event was recapped. There was discussion and planning on the Fractured Fairy Tale fund raiser, and the Volunteer Recognition event this fall.

#### Facilities Committee

Lynne Pederson reported. 2018 projects in consideration are replacing the kitchen appliances, and refurbishing or replacing the benches in the women's locker room.

#### <u>Membership Committee</u>

Lynne Pederson reported. The committee discussed the featured stories in the Northfield News and the feedback we are getting from those articles.

#### Executive Director Report

Lynne Pederson reported. The renewal of a contract with the Northfield Hospital and Clinics Rehabilitation Services is being negotiated for the use of the pool. 
