Riki Kölbl Nelson, Wine Cellar Doors January 5 - February 6

Riki Kölbl Nelson grew up in Austria and moved to the United States as a young adult. The artwork in this exhibit is part of her journey to her native country. She writes, "On my last visit to my father's home village in the wine district of Lower Austria I took a series of photos in the wine cellar street that runs at a right angle from the main street. The cellars, owned by families for generations, are lined up side by side (as do the houses on the main street). Narrow steps lead up to the vineyards above, whereas the cellar floor slants down into the earth below. The wine is stored in large barrels and often tasted with family members and visitors in the entrance area, where benches and a table are set up.

My art work is based on photos of the doors to these wine cellars, including the one belonging to one of my cousins. I use acrylic paints and mediums, as well as photocopy collages to capture the patterns and textures. Exploring this theme gives me the pleasure of calling up fond memories of visits spanning many years."

NORTHFIELD ACT ON ALZHEIMER'S

The Northfield ACT on Alzheimer's committee met in August, 2013, for a forum called "Community Conversations on Improving Outcomes for People with Alzheimer's Disease." Representatives from Three Links, Rice County Social Services, and the Northfield Senior Center became lead partners in the undertaking to make Northfield a "Dementia Friendly Community. As the grant that made this project possible is drawing to a close the committee continues to work toward increasing awareness of the signs of Alzheimer's, to improve the coordination and communication of services for caretakers and care receivers and to work with the medical community to develop a pathway of service for patients dealing with this disease. As a part of this grant, the Center will be housing an "Alzheimer's Library" with books that will be available to be checked out in early 2016.




